From Our Minister

Dear church family,

Psalm 150 declares:

Praise the Lord.

Praise God in his sanctuary;

praise him in his mighty heavens.

Praise him for his acts of power;

praise him for his surpassing greatness.

Praise him with the sounding of the trumpet,

praise him with the harp and lyre,

praise him with timbrel and dancing,

praise him with the strings and pipe,

praise him with the clash of cymbals,

praise him with resounding cymbals.

Let everything that has breath praise the Lord.

Praise the Lord.

What does it mean to you to “praise the Lord”? How do you “praise”?

In English, we have one word for “praise”, but in the original language of the Old Testament, Hebrew, there are several:

- there's YADAH – which means lifting your hands in praise and thanksgiving.
- there's SHABACH – which means to shout or to declare triumph.
- there's TEHILLAH – which means a song of praise, and it can signify praise that's due to God simply because of who He is, because of His glory.
- there's BARAK – which means to bless or to kneel.
- there's ZAMAR – which means to make music and implies the use of stringed instruments.
- there's HALAL – the root of the word ‘Hallelujah’ – and it means to shine, to boast, or to celebrate, and it's got a sense of exuberance and unrestrained joy about it.

As you can see, all of these words are very expressive. Praise in the Old Testament is not just standing still and quietly mumbling a few words – it involves our whole bodies: our hands, lifted up in thanksgiving or playing instruments; our lips shouting to declare God's triumph and singing songs; our knees bending in humility; our feet dancing exuberantly – just as David did before the Ark in 2 Samuel 6.

I wonder: We might not be the most expressive of people, but how can we learn from our Jewish forebears? How might our praise



deepen and overflow, engaging all that we are? How might our adoration and thanksgiving be made visible?

As Psalm 63:5 (Passion translation) says, “I overflow with praise when I come before you, for the anointing of your presence satisfies me like nothing else. You are such a rich banquet of pleasure to my soul.”

Jesus Died to Save the Planet – Part 2

As we saw last month, God's plan is global in scale. It's for the reconciling of (that is, making peace with) all things. It's for the uniting and renewing of all things. It's achieved through the blood of Jesus Christ shed on the cross. And centre stage is his redemption of humanity – we have an important part to play in God's mission. We'll come to that. Before we do, though, we must look squarely at the coming storm.

A storm of our own making - facing the breakdown

The planet, God's world, is in big trouble. Earth scientists are running out of words for urgency. As UN Secretary-General António Guterres put it, we're at 'Code red for humanity... the alarm bells are deafening, and the evidence is irrefutable: greenhouse gas emissions from fossil fuel burning and deforestation are choking our planet and putting billions of people at immediate risk.' It's getting much hotter, fast. Pollution and destruction are pushing life everywhere over the edge, with terrible consequences for us, our neighbours, and the creatures around us, the birds of the air, the swarming creatures of the waters, the creeping things and wild animals of the earth.

Temperatures over the last five years are (on average) 1.2°C hotter now than in 1850–1900. In 2023, the average temperature was nearly 1.5°C hotter (yet another unwanted record), even reaching over 2°C for a couple of days in November. Scientists expect it to take only a decade for these temperatures to become the norm. On the course we're on, we'll reach a catastrophic 3°C hotter by the end of the century.

Earth scientists fear that beyond 1.5°C – the so-called 'safe level' – the earth is increasingly likely to reach tipping points – such as the melting of the Greenland and Antarctic ice sheets and permafrost, and the dieback of forests and rainforests. For example, as the ice sheets melt, less of the Sun's heat is reflected back into space, instead being absorbed by land and oceans, leading to further heating. The result: a heating cascade we can't control.⁹

Just like in the human body, every degree makes a huge difference. Coral reefs – home to sharks and rays, barracuda, sun fish and angel fish, parrot fish and clown fish, and thousands of others – are dying. At 1.5°C hotter,

70–90% of coral reefs are lost, and at 2°C, more than 99%. Amazon and Congo Basin rainforests gradually become dry savannah. Closer to home, rising temperatures mean Atlantic Puffin breeding sites empty as heating oceans take their sand-eel prey too far from the colony. It's the same for ecosystem after ecosystem. Innumerable species pushed to the edge and then – as it gets hotter – gone.

A hotter world isn't just bad news for the living ecosystems around us. It's bad news for us, too. First the poorest and most vulnerable, then everyone. Orbisa, bringing up her nine children in Ethiopia, has seen no rain for three years. The riverbed dry, she now walks miles for water. In desperation she has slaughtered her livestock for food. She and her family must move to see if there is somewhere they can grow food or make a living.

Oceans emptied of teeming life, skies of soaring birds, and lands of 'creeping things and wild animals'. Hardly an ecosystem is not under threat from human activity. We make deserts, it seems, of all we touch. It's not just that these ecosystems provide us with clean air and water, flood defences, soil stability, and crop pollinators and help to keep the earth cool by absorbing greenhouse gases. It's that we also suffer the loss of the intricate beauty of the complex world around us. The planet – we and all life on earth – is in big trouble. But that's not how it's supposed to be!

Next month, we'll explore how restoring creation fits in with God's plans and purposes.


